

The Program

1226 Sumer is Icumen In, Medieval English polyphonic song in the Wessex dialect. The manuscript can be seen in the British Library.

1200's *Motetus*, a sacred motet in Latin for several voices. Pronounced not potatoes but potatUS.

1500 *Porque Llorax*, "Why do you weep?" A Portuguese song of mourning from the Sephardic diaspora. A couple is separated...a love is lost.

1599 Weep Oh Mine Eyes, An English Madrigal by John Bennet, written as homage to composer John Dowland, sung by Sarah Dalton- Phillips.

1607 Ayre, Thomas Ford, probably from his collection "Musicke of Sundrie Kindes" written for 4 instruments.

1681 Sonata No.1, Arcangelo Corelli, a "church" sonata containing 3 short movements; Preludio- slow, Allemande- faster, and Sarabanda- slow.

1695 Hole in the Wall, Henry Purcell, a country dance tune written for the Playford 's edition of 1698- a book for dance masters to use in creating dances.

1730? The Marvel of Peru, James Oswald, One of his "Airs for the Seasons" (96 miniatures each the name of a flower), this is the common "Four O'Clock".

1739 *Violin Sonata No.5*, 1st movement, George Phillip Telemann, a trio sonata, one among a tremendous number of works by this most prolific of Baroque composers.

1740? *Quodlibet*, Johann Sebastian Bach, Latin for "what pleases", a quodlibet contains elements from diverse sources; secular and sacred, serious and amusing. This is heard in variation 30 of the Goldberg Variations.

1740? Giguetta and Little Prelude No. 6, Written for violin, the Giguetta is a variation of a set of sarabandes for violin, the Prelude is one of many piano works

written by Bach for his son Wilhelm Friedman Bach. Arranged here for Clarinet and Flute.

1791 Ave Verum Corpus, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, A short gloriously beautiful, loved and well known choral piece written for the feast of Corpus Christi, it is only 46 measures long and was written only 6 months before Mozart's death.

1794 London Trio No.1, Josef Haydn, Written in three movements, allegro, andante and a lively vivace, for the unusual grouping of 2 flutes and cello. The flute at that time had become the second most popular amateur instrument harpsichord was the first.

1948 *Petite Marche Militaire*. Francis Poulenc, from his Suite Francaise d'apres Claude Gervaise. Short, and following the London Trio, it will sound quite Modern but cheerful and bright and still "whistle-able".

1967 When I'm 64, Paul McCartney /John Lennon, From the Beatles Album Sgt.Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band. Sing along if you like!

1907 The Teddy Bear's Picnic, John Bratton OUT OF CHRONILOGIC ORDER! But it is our sign off- obligatory encore tune so please just enjoy it!
